### **EVENTS OF THE MONTH**

# ONE DEATH IS ALWAYS ONE TOO MANY, BUT THIS MONTH IT WAS TWO YOUNG MEN WHO LOST THEIR LIVES, HIT BY A TRUCK, IN CALAIS:

AHMED, died on 10<sup>th</sup> May, on the ring road ( the A 26). It wasn't even an attempt to break into a truck... He was just trying to cross the road.

Salam was represented the next day at the rally organized in his memory, at 6:30 p.m., in front of Richelieu Park.

He was buried in the northern cemetery of Calais on Friday, 19th May at 2:30 p.m.

**ANOTHER YOUNG MAN, ON 31**st **MAY**, was crushed on a roundabout by a truck in which he was trying to board.

"A gentle and discreet man. May the earth be light to him... as they say in Africa," Ferri writes.


How many deaths will it take for us to decide to take into consideration these people who seek only peace...

**A COMMEMORATION OF THE DEATH OF LITTLE MAWDA** took place on 17<sup>th</sup> May in Grande-Synthe, at 6 pm, in front of the Espace Jeunes du Moulin, where she was staying with her family... On the ground was unrolled the list of deaths at the French-British border.

That was exactly five years ago.

Mawda, who was under two years old, was killed by a Belgian policeman during a chase. She was with her parents in a smugglers' van on a Belgian motorway.

### ATTEMPTS TO CROSS INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM are not decreasing.

400 crossings were reported, for example, by the Home Office on the weekend of  $6^{th}$ /  $7^{th}$  May. Some spend three days in the dunes waiting for the order of departure from their smugglers. Sometimes they are not called: we met a whole group on May 22, who were returning to Calais after three days of waiting in Loon-Plage...

Sometimes the start is missed: people testify that their boat was punctured by the police while they were already on the water, something which is prohibited.

And those who left... Sometimes they come back to our side of the water: the engine has failed, or the canoe has taken on water because it has been filled by the waves or because it has deflated...

Then they come out of the sea dripping with water and shivering with cold.

On 15<sup>th</sup> May, the Salam team saw a whole group of people arrive soaked from ear to ear. She was able to dress them all (just) with her "shipwreck kits": bags with enough to dress someone from head to toe. There were about forty of them. On the other hand, there was no longer enough to help people who would have needed a change of clothes but who did not get out of the water...

#### MAY 8: FEAST OF LIBERATION...

An eventful weekend on the coast. Many refugees have tried their luck. Many managed to reach the English coast. And there are all the others. Which have NO CHANCE and which often find themselves soaked and helpless on the coast. Abounded by a state that is not doing its job.

Often the associations are accused of complicity with smugglers, to attract refugees to Calais and much worse. Rarely are they praised for being there... to do the job of a heartless state.

To understand the words humanity and fraternity.

And to be there in the right place at the right time.

Yet THANK YOU to all of you for being there again and again to make the lives of these hundreds of men, women and children a little more bearable.

This is also Freedom! Listen to your heart. Happy LIBERATION Day. For everyone.

(Ferri, a volunteer at Salam in Calais, is Dutch).

The number of attendees is increasing at our two sites, with the hope of passage.

It is always extremely difficult to count the number of refugees in a city: first they move all the time! And then presence is a relative thing: should we include those who have left the city but are not yet on the water? Those who have not yet arrived on the other side? those who have come from elsewhere to cross (from Paris, often, according to what they say) but who will return very quickly in case of failure?

Evaluating the number of meals given is the most objective thing we can do.

In Dunkirk, since the middle of the month, in May, 400 meals have been distributed a day. In Calais we exceeded more and more often the 500 breakfasts, up to 678 on 30<sup>th</sup> May. Since 13<sup>th</sup> May, it has been necessary to add a thermos of ten litres of tea to the quantity already increased at the end of April... and the whole supply of milk is exhausted.

# **POLICE EVACUATIONS** continue to be the rule... **In Calais**.

the HRO resumed its observations at the end of April and the publication of the observations on 9<sup>th</sup> May, so we again have visibility on the pace and conditions of the dismantling.

As already at the beginning of the year, the pressure is less strong, that is to say that there was no dismantling on one day of all the camps. A maximum of four camps are involved (on  $27^{th}$  May), usually between one and three. BMX was hit each time from  $17^{th}$  to  $31^{st}$  and only affected on  $19^{th}$ ,  $21^{st}$  and  $23^{rd}$  May. It seems that the authorities have decided to prevent any resettlement there, taking advantage of a competition at this place on the weekend of May  $13^{th}$  / $14^{th}$ : it was necessary to clear the way for the arrival of the public...

This does not mean that it is a symbolic path of the Police...



Police deployment is disproportionate: it is made to frighten.

On 29th May, we see again police armed with LBD: pictured behind the PASS.

On 9th May, eight CRS vans were moved just to move six people and seize a tent full of equipment on Rue de Judée. On 15th May, seven CRS vans moved under the only George V bridge to arrest, it is true, all the occupants. But these are three poor guys who show no signs of resistance. And two tents full of equipment are taken away. And these are just two examples.

On 27th May, a CRS told an HRO volunteer that "It's always going well"... Indeed, the exiles put up no resistance, no need to hit or gas them.

This gentleman obviously lacks any imagination: would he find that everything is going well if he had to leave his tent in the morning to repack all his belongings and move them a little further to reinstall them later?

It is already a terrible violence...










But is there really nothing brutal about these "quiet" evacuations?

On the 15th as on the 25th, in the city centre, the police shake the tents to wake up the guys. Even if they give them time to go out, is this a normal situation?

On the 21st, at BMX, out of 4 people evicted with their tents, two find themselves deprived of them: the tents were not seized but they were demolished in the move







These dismantling are often accompanied by palpations of the exiles... It's another form of violence... And it's not uncommon for this to end in arrests. (These photos were taken in the City Center, the first two on 15<sup>th</sup> May, the third on 17<sup>th</sup> May).









It is enough to see the state of the ground after the evacuation of 27<sup>th</sup> May at Fort Nieulay, to no longer believe that these operations are not violent...

The HRO is usually kept away from operations by a "security perimeter" that is supposed to protect them and other citizens. But of what? Moreover, on the 25th, in the City Center, two people are authorized to cross the perimeter. The HRO asks why this difference. They are told: "They do not hinder the police operation in any way"...

Finally things are clear and we are reassured for the safety of Calais residents that we let these lines cross ... And on 31st May, it's an orienteering race that crosses the "crime scene"!

At other times, the associations note, during their visits to the city, other shocking behaviour of the Police Forces: on May 5 at the station, at the arrival of the Paris train at 1:26 p.m., the PAF operates an identity check that only affects people of colour... This discrimination is strictly prohibited by French law... On the evening of 24th May, volunteers from another association witnessed the gassing of a group that obviously wanted to embark on a small road by the sea. All of them, including women and children, had been gassed in their eyes.

A few exceptions make it possible to maintain confidence in humanity. I will not give the place or the date so as not to put this gentleman in difficulty, but it happened that a CRS guided the HRO to a place still distant, but which gives a better point of view on the operations...

### In Dunkirk:

Evacuations are much more spaced than in Calais: thirty in 2022, ten since 1<sup>st</sup> January (5 months). There were none between 12<sup>th</sup> April and 4<sup>th</sup> May and between 4<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> May. But they are more radical..

This month, over two days ( $4^{th}$  and  $5^{th}$  May ), the Mardyck camp was permanently razed. It was the total and definitive evacuation that we had been dreading since we learned that the land had been leased to companies. The prosecutor's request is presented to the HRO



On the morning of 4<sup>th</sup> May, an associative group sitting on the ground demonstrated peacefully at the entrance of the camp...



A camp surrounded by the Police...



...incredibly many.

In addition, arrive 20 CRS vans, then 15 gendarmerie vans, 15 of the National Police and a dozen fire engines.

The other associations and journalists were then blocked at the red light down on the D 601, even MDM which had to take people to an appointment at the hospital.

A lot of material was collected.

Six buses left.

One exile said they had a choice between getting on the bus or being arrested. As usual, they were not told where they were going.

The prefect spoke of 300 evacuees, including 120 who boarded the buses, according to a journalist.

The PAF made at least fifteen arrests, including two women. They were handcuffed. Some escaped into the fields. That morning ADRA had not been able to distribute any breakfast. Salam distributed about thirty meals while raiding in search of fugitives.







In the afternoon two back ploughs destroyed everything.






In particular, the land at the access to the former distribution area was turned over to prevent any vehicle passage.

That same evening a hundred people were back under the storm. No sheltering was obtained either from the town hall of Dunkirk or the sub-prefecture.

The next day,  $5^{th}$  May, a second evacuation finished the job with 10 CRS vans.

The remaining equipment has been collected and is not recoverable (no Ressourcerie in Dunkirk).





Those who were still there leave the camp under police escort:



The Roots water tanks were no longer there, but they were the ones who had removed them and, since then, they have been distributing them in marauders.

One police officer said that evacuations would continue as long as people relocated to Total property, and that two or three more similar operations could be expected the following week, but this was not necessary: the camp moved to the Loon-Plage Travellers' area..





It is a much more comfortable place, or rather less uncomfortable: no mud, shady ground...

... At the edge of a body of water that, if you frame the photo well (if you frame it well only) gives an impression of beachside ...

But there is still no water point (apart from a fire hydrant at the entrance )...

... No toilets or dumpsters. Garbage accumulates at the entrance to the access road.



We know from the beginning that the days are numbered, and indeed on 25<sup>th</sup> May is posted on the ground the request for interim measures useful measures (the Administrative Court has one week to decide whether or not to evacuate an illegally occupied place). Thanks to ROOTS who sent us the photos.

This request, dated  $25^{th}$  May , posted in the afternoon the same day, announces the judgment for  $31^{st}$  May (it is important to note that May  $27^{th}$  / $28^{th}$  and  $29^{th}$  are the Whitsun weekend...)

It states that it is the CUD that is competent for the reception of travellers since 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2020 and that this area is illegally occupied by migrants.

A bailiff found that this area has no sanitary facilities, water, electricity or garbage collection (to which, suddenly, the occupants set fire ...).

The hearing was carefully prepared in the short time allotted by Salam and the HRO.

On 31<sup>st</sup> May, before the judge, the representative of the CUD justified the need for this evacuation by booking, for 25<sup>th</sup> June, a group of one hundred caravans of travellers, but did not bring any supporting documents.

The judge gives him until Friday, 2<sup>nd</sup> June at 4 p.m. to produce some. The judgement will not be handed down until the following week.

(These documents were produced on time...)

The occupiers' lawyer, Lionel Crusoe, who has already accompanied us on numerous court battles, speaks at length about the complex situation of the inhabitants, the many forced displacements, and the loss of their personal belongings that this entails. He also talks about the work of the associations (material aid and information work) and the need to stabilize the camp to allow this work (he says he provides the judge with a detailed certificate of MDM).

He says there has been no diagnosis made. Listening to the occupants and getting to know the public before evacuation must still be done...

We insist, at the exit, to the lawyer and the journalist of AFP, on the fact that we have nothing against travellers, that we always refuse to oppose precariousness.

We are not asking that the evacuation not take place. We ask that the exiles not simply be sent back on the roads but moved to a more dignified place. We are not asking for a "4-star" campsite, we are just asking for a place with a water point, toilets, and a dumpster regularly collected.

It is always the same: these undignified conditions are the reason why people are hunted without finding a proper place for them: the Mardyck camp (occupied from December 7 to May 4) was much worse than those of the Pont à Roseaux (occupied from 23<sup>rd</sup> November to 7<sup>th</sup> December, 2022) itself much worse than that of the Petit Prédembourg de Grande-Synthe from which they had been definitively returned on 23<sup>rd</sup> November, 2021).

However, showers in gymnasiums resumed on 8<sup>th</sup> May, the Carrefour des solidarités informed us the next day: "We inform you that the shower operation began yesterday and that it will be deployed over the coming weeks with the valuable assistance of the Red Cross, ROOTS, RWC and the community."

The certainty that this camp set up on the Travellers' area could not be evacuated before the court judgment gave hope that there would be no new evacuations before the 31st .Fortunately Roots was on call on the morning of the 30th and the relay was quickly taken over by the HRO:

The former Loon-Plage camps (main camps between  $23^{rd}$  November , 2021 and  $7^{th}$  December, 2022) were evacuated that day in a rather brutal and radical way.

The HRO is sent to the Clauser company. "But you don't see anything at all," they complain.

"You've figured it all out," replies the policeman who sends them there.

16 CRS vans were moved.

There were more than twenty-four arrests.

People are being expelled...







... The material is collected systematically: tents, clothes and blankets have been seized and taken to the dump in dumpsters.

At 11:45 a.m., the HRO saw people leaving with their bags but without their tents. At 12:20 p.m., they see the riot police preventing people from resettling or returning to collect their belongings.

At 9:20 am, they counted 48 people boarding the AFEJI buses for a departure in CAES. On the morning, they saw 125 people settle there and a third was to arrive... In total, the HRO counted (including buses) 285 people deported, including at least fifteen women, children and MNAs. Again, where are they all going to go?...

"Happy ending" of this sad page: there are still moments of peace, in the morning, when finally the exiles are sure that the police will not come to dislodge them...

#### THE ANNUAL STATUTORY GA OF 2023.

The 2023 Annual Statutory GA was held on 16th May at 6:30 p.m. at Salle Guérin in Grande-Synthe.

The meeting began with the President's keynote address and a historical background:

The association is just 20 years old.

Jean-Claude Lenoir recalls 1997, the distribution of sardines and boiled eggs in the fields, in the blockhouses between Blériot and Sangatte. He evokes these marauding with a flashlight, with Jean-Pierre Leclercq. It pays tribute to this founding president, who died too soon by illness...

He recalls the period when exiles, especially Iraqi Kurds and Afghans, were blocked by the police between their buses and the walls of houses, then sat on the ground in the water and handcuffed with plastic handcuffs.

It recalls the "Boron Hangar", then the Sangatte Center from 1999 to the end of 2002, whose destruction was shortly followed by the official creation of the Salam association on 31st May, 2003.

Twenty years later Salam is still here...

At the end of this testimony, we invite you to meet around a refreshment that we plan.





## IN THE FACE OF THE "FOG", SCIENCE IS UNANIMOUS AND CITIZENS MOBILIZE

Bénédicte Halba, author of this text, directs a research institute (iriv) which has been working on the theme of migration since 2003 and proposes a club to the Cité des Métiers to promote a migratory journey since 2012.

According to Le Petit Robert (1990 edition), fog is "a natural phenomenon produced by extremely small drops of water that float in the air near the ground and cause intense light scattering". The sailors feared this climatic phenomenon because they no longer knew how to orientate themselves, they depended only on their compass which indicated the direction but not the possible obstacles in their path. In commerce, in the seventeenth century, the term was the book where transactions were noted as they were made, a kind of handrail or "draft" to prepare the accounts at the end of the financial year. In the nineteenth century the Prussian general Carl von Clausewitz, a reference in the art of war, theorized the "fog" as a strategy, a vagueness voluntarily maintained by the belligerents on their forces, their positions or their objectives. For Joseph Henrotin, researcher at the Center for Analysis and Forecasting of International Risks, editor-in-chief of the magazine "Defence & International Security" "Fog is the structural condition of war. It is provoked to ensure the safety of operations." He welcomes the Ukrainian military strategy that has worked wonders in this area since February 2022 in the face of the Russian attack and which is even preparing a counter-offensive in May 2023.

In France, the greatest vagueness, "fog", reigns over the issue of immigration, eminently sensitive, which loses a public opinion cleverly manipulated by extremist theses. The law on asylum and immigration that was to be debated in spring 2023 was finally postponed, sine die, to the autumn by the government. Several texts should come to replace it.

La Cimade², an association that has been "defending the dignity and rights of refugees and migrants" for 80 years, "this announcement was the only one possible: in the social, political and democratic crisis we are experiencing, our society needs solidarity, cohesion and justice more than ever; Certainly not more repression and stigmatization of exiled people, through a bill that carried serious violations of rights. The association recalls the long list of "people who died on the roads of exile" in an almost general indifference, the daily life of many migrants in France characterized by precariousness and abuse, and finally the threats against "elected officials and citizens in favor of welcoming exiled people" expressed by "far-right movements". La Cimade continues, against all odds, to mobilize for "the regularization of all undocumented people", and for a dignified and safe reception at our borders.

At the initiative of the Desinfox-Migration association, a collective of 400 scientists called in February 2023 for "the creation of a citizens' convention on migration"<sup>3</sup>. They write that it is "urgent to restore reason and democratic debate in the treatment of migration issues". They recall facts attested by all disciplines (sociology, economics, political science, law, history, philosophy": there is no migratory submersion, regularizations or rescues at sea have never created air inflows and the "replacement theory" is a conspiracy mystification. Yet, despite their repeated efforts, scientists find that the results of their research are ignored, or worse diverted into public debates (not frankly contradictory) and political discourses (often biased). According to the UN, while migration is undeniably increasing worldwide, international migrants represent less than 4% of the world's population in 2020. In addition, migration flows to the countries of the "Global South" are quantitatively equivalent to flows to developed countries. The researchers add that France ranks 77th in the world for the proportion of immigrants in its population (with 10% of immigrants, some of whom are of French nationality) far behind the countries of the Arabian Peninsula, Luxembourg, Switzerland, Canada, Australia and the United States. The authors of the op-ed insist on the "excessive politicization" of migration and integration issues that distorts our representations. In particular, the general public overestimates the number of foreigners in France. An encouraging sign is the minority tolerance index<sup>4</sup>, which tells us that prejudice has receded and tolerance for others has increased. The signatories' proposal is to create a space for democratic dialogue where citizens can "form their own opinion" and express "an informed judgment" with the help of scientists. The citizens' convention for the convention would be inspired by the climate convention. The authors recall that initiatives such as the International Group of Experts on Migration or the States General on Migration have laid the foundations for this democratic discussion. They suggest associating the State and the Economic, Social and Environmental Council<sup>5</sup>.

After the Ocean Viking episode in November, it is quite appalling to see the exchange of bittersweet words between the French Minister of the Interior and the Italian government<sup>6</sup>, which pursues a policy openly hostile to asylum and immigration. Our minister does not blame his Italian counterparts for their lack of solidarity and humanity in the face of refugees and migrants, but for the fact that their policy is not effective enough, after having made the same reproaches to his French far-right political opponent. Is this a misplaced and cynical provocation, or a political line that the Minister of the Interior is about to put in place? The "fog" may be effective in Ukraine but certainly not in France and the European Union on asylum and migration policy.

" she wrote in her CR of the day.





On the other hand, tarpaulins, pieces of 3m by 3m (or 2.50m by 3m), cost much less and allow an honest man to spend a night in under cover.

BLANKETS (DUVETS, SLEEPING BAGS).

hygiene products (shampoo, shower gel, deodorant, sunscreen, etc.), especially razors, towels,

men's clothing from XS to XL: underpants, long underpants and thermal leggings and thermal sweaters, socks, jogging pants, jeans, shorts, t-shirts, SHOES for men: trainers or light hiking shoes (sizes 40 to 46),

sandles, caps.

backpacks, lamps and batteries, water packs, bags (small backpacks, garbage bags, freezer bags, tote bags and plastic bags)

### **Food for Calais:**

Milk tea and sugar, soluble coffee, cans of sardines and cans of tuna, cream cheese, dried fruits, Power banks.


