


THE PHOTO OF THE MONTH

EDITORIAL

Secularism is not about denying the "word" to believers, of all religions. On the contrary, it means listening to them, all of them, with respect, and bringing them together, when what they say corresponds to our values, to build a wall against intolerance.

Last month we published on our Facebook page a passage from a speech by Pope Francis that said exactly what Salam's volunteers and members think.

This month, we find in the press a sentence by Rabbi Delphine Horvilleur, who published a tribute, to "support those who know that no pain is soothed, and that no death is avenged, by starving innocent people or condemning children." (the "Voice of the North" of 11th May 2025).

Here too, these are the words that we could have written. She was talking about the Gaza Strip but she is in line with what D.P. (a volunteer in Salam) wrote a few days ago when talking about life in our camps of misfortune on the North Sea coast. He appealed to our leaders:

"No one can or will be able to say then among the politicians and decision-makers..., that he did not know that the State does not even guarantee access to water and food in dignified conditions for children and families. »

EVENTS OF THE MONTH

DEATHS.

It was over... we almost ended up believing it... But no, it was only the weather that was unfavourable to a passage by sea: sun but strong wind and blowing in the wrong direction (north-east for a south-west route.)

Five more mourning's in the month of May, of course always at night because the passages must be as discreet as possible to succeed, even if it is more dangerous...

- On the night of Tuesday 13th to Wednesday 14th May: a man (a 39-year-old Eritrean) died, in a car park, in Marck in Calais. He was crushed by the truck he was trying to get into...
- Four died at sea in an attempt, to cross,

*one on the night of Sunday 11th to Monday 12th May, off the coast of Boulogne,

*the other just a week later, on the night of Sunday 18th to Monday 19th May: the rescuers sent to the scene saw the overly loaded dinghy break up...

*On the night of Tuesday 20th to Wednesday 21st May, it was a lady and a little girl of eight years old whose bodies were found at the bottom of a large dinghy... "Found the bodies... This means that they did not drown... This means that they have been suffocated or trampled on by the pressure of others... But they were at least 80 on this boat... No wonder the most fragile were crushed...

These are conditions that then crush all humanity...



That's nineteen for 2025...

And it becomes almost "Normal"

We try to leave this inhuman border, and we die...

Drowned... or run over by a truck or suffocated on a boat.

We die because there is no...

""Safe route"" to have a real life.....

The Borders are blocked with barbed wire... rocks and police. But when you have a real dream, NOTHING STOPS YOU!! OPEN THE BORDERS








On the 21st in Dunkirk, we were surprised to see, on our arrival, between 150 and 200 people waiting for us: they were coming out of the "Health and Social Action" congress of the CGT whose day had just ended...

Emotional people, many speeches, a strong moment...



If the banner is trampled on every time, it is not out of lack of respect for our dead, it is simply to prevent the wind from carrying it away...



The burial of an exile, who died in October, was announced to us on 22nd May by the "death group":

The funeral of Majed AL HUSEIN, a Syrian person who died on 23/10/2024 in a shipwreck, will take place on Friday 23/05/2025 at around 14:30h at the southern cemetery of Calais (4 Av. Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, 62100 Calais).

His family would be touched by your presence to pay tribute to him.

THE NUMBER OF EXILES INCREASED, THE SITUATION BECAME TENSE...

With the difficult passages, the number of people in the camps increases, stress mounts. There are many of them and they are hungry.

In Calais, in May, we gave more than 600 breakfasts every day, even more than 700 and 820 on the 16th... except the 12th (565), the 10th (385) and the 24th (540). 385 is the figure that stands out, it was right in the period of successful crossings: the 12th is the day when there were 601 crossings, two days before people are in the dunes waiting for the signal from their smuggler.

In Dunkirk, we gave at least 600 hot meals almost every day (500 and 550 on the 12th and 13th), but we exceeded 900 from 22nd May. We know, in any case, that when the number of guests exceeds 500 meals, we are forced to reduce the portions. Can we be satisfied with this situation?

The atmosphere of meal distribution is very variable but often difficult.

The conclusion of the report of the distribution of 10th May is: "beautiful distribution in calm, always moving considering the number of women and children." We have given 600 meals. 6th May, with the same number of guests, is one of the worst days in the world.

Volunteer Testimonial:

Our team gave about 600 meals at lunchtime on Loon-Plage.

Seeing the push and the outstretched hands, I admit that I thought of the images we receive from the Gaza Strip, even though I know, of course, that it is not comparable, not yet...

The mass of men is there in front of us, no way to make a line, not two, not three. (The women are in a semblance of a line on the side) They are calm, smiling, full of hope, we harangue a little, in my kitchen English, Greg in a language that many understand (in the stress that we are under I didn't think to ask him which one): "There is food, we will distribute, but please don't push."

They smile, they nod yes, with conviction.

In the meantime, the tables are set up, the hot dish boxes are out. The first trays are filled... And then the bulldozer starts, the mass of men advances, inexorably, imperceptibly, but it advances. We who are distributing the spoons are stuck against the tables...

We stopped the distribution several times to calm the push and tried to make adjustments: "What if we put this table like this, and if we gave one of the boxes there, on the side, and if we tried three lines..." » At one point we only gave the hot dish, without dessert, then without bread, to speed up the distribution and reduce the crowd...

And I saw our matriarch and team manager, who still has pain in her knees and back pain, throw herself into the crowd of men (you have, the ones who don't have ears!) to try to make them back off. She didn't really succeed but what a will and what energy...

At the very end, the very last ones wisely made two peaceful queues...

What dominated in me, in the end, was not fatigue (it will come out when it comes home), nor anger, nor fear, after this uncontrollable pressure (they didn't come out, they weren't aggressive at all, only hungry...)

What dominated was pride, team pride...

I am proud to be part of this team in which each person was inhabited by the determination not to give up (not a look that asks us to stop everything and go home) but a desire to do everything possible to still give food...

A man at the end came to see us to apologize for their indiscipline, in an English that sounds like mine: You good, you very good, we bad, sorry, sorry, too hungry...

Sorry, sorry, thank you.

And he had a beautiful, happy, full smile...

The number of meals donated is always less than the number of people present in the camps (some are too far away, others prefer to cook themselves, others certainly do not have access to the distribution site due to the influence of passage networks). But the increases go hand in hand...

Fortunately RCK, which had stopped distribution on 4th April (see our newsletter last month), which penalized exiles, both people from Dunkirk and Calais, has resumed its activities with the reopening of the premises of the Auberge de Migrants.

Adrien, their coordinator, informed by WhatsApp on 8th May:

"As of today, the warehouse and the associations that occupy it will return to normal activity. Any organization outside the warehouse can also go there. »

Deliveries resume every working day in Calais, and in Dunkirk also on Wednesday afternoons (distributions by Roots) and Fridays (distributions by MRS).

The meeting of 29th April with the sub-prefect and the prefect delegate for security and defence of the northern zone had highlighted the tensions with the population of Loon-Plage (see our newsletter last month).



We can fear a rise in racism and the violence it entails. On 10th May, ROOTS returned to its showers, installed next to the water points, overturned and put out of use.

Of course the wrong action was not signed or claimed, but it is reminiscent of the contamination by a bright blue liquid of 14th June, 2024 in the same place, it is no coincidence that this happened just after the European elections which had shown the rise of far-right parties in France, especially since other xenophobic acts had occurred at the same time in Calais (see our newsletter of June 2024).

Last month, we welcomed the reminder of the law and respect for human rights by the prefect and the sub-prefect during this meeting on 29th April. Unfortunately, the solutions proposed by the authorities do not calm our concerns: the "action plan" is presented in the "Voix du Nord" of Thursday, May 8th 2025.

- The doubling of buses during rush hour with the presence of "a CUD mediation agent in each bus to "regulate the flow of passengers and make relations more fluid".

This is a very good measure if "regulating" does not mean systematically excluding exiles, and moreover identified on what criteria?

- Waste collection will be intensified.

We have been asking for it since the departure of the Grande-Synthe camps in November 2021, there has already been progress in December 2023 with the installation of a large skip by the CUD near (and then inside) the distribution site. Will three more skips be enough, with the dispersal of the camps over the geographical area, observed in recent months?

- "The deployment of an additional unit of mobile forces (...) because it will be a question of systematically dismantling the camps that are too close to the houses."

Of course, they get closer to the houses because they are chased out of the industrial zone, and as a result they are chased towards the inhabited zone...

From evacuation to evacuation, they are pushed westwards...

The camps will arrive in Gravelines, where we will see (logically) a protest movement of companies and the population...

This last measure is not designed to reassure us...

In the last few months, we have seen three dismantling operations per month in the Dunkirk sector.

Since this announcement of measures on 8^{th} May, evacuations have indeed multiplied, five in the month: There had already been one on 6^{th} May ... Then on 9^{th} May, there was demolition of the stalls in and near the distribution site.

then on the 15th, on four sites and on the 20th and 28th on three sites, which are not near the houses... If it is a question of relieving the inhabitants, the only method found is to discourage the exiles to make them flee... But once again, to where?

Jean-Claude Lenoir's words still resonate:

"And January 26th, 2024 was! And our Minister of the Interior said: "We don't respond to suffering by sending CRS" The new Minister of the Interior had arrived!

STINGY!

We are all ready to welcome this new vintage! Let's talk about it again...

(excerpt from the President's Message in this January 2024 newsletter. The Minister of the Interior cited was Gérald Darmanin, who was renewed in his post two weeks before, on January 11th, 2024

PASSAGES IN ENGLAND...

... and they pass. Despite all the efforts of the authorities with the help of the Force Publique, they still pass, by sea or by trucks, (as shown by the recent circumstances of the deaths):

From the 24th to the 30th, for seven days, any passage was impossible due to violent and unfavourable winds... The Home Office counted 2,543 visits over the month on 30th May, a little less than in May 2024 (2,881 with between 49 and 50 people per boat). It was the first time in the calendar year that the number in 2025 was lower than the previous year... But May had 31 days, the wind had calmed down, and on May 31st the Home Office announced 1,194 successful passages on 18 canoes (an average of more than 66 people per boat)...

In the end, 3,737 crossings were successful in May, according to the Home Office, on 63 boats: more than 59 people on average per boat, but it ranges from between 37 and 38 on May1st to more than 63 on the 21st... On that day, the official figure for successful arrivals in the UK was 825...

We were waiting for this figure of May 31st with a concern mixed with hope: the hope of seeing these people, stuck in undignified situations in unsanitary camps, finally get out... and the fear of seeing deaths by drowning added to the list of deaths...

On the evening of June 1^{st} , the wind picked up, the number of meals distributed in our two cities had not decreased that day (912 breakfasts in Calais by Salam and 800 in Dunkirk by ADRA) and the Calais teams reported with horror groups of exiles, newly arrived, who were wandering in the city, visibly brought by the conviction that the crossings had resumed and that "tomorrow England . »

We who are the first on the ground in the morning in Calais, we meet especially those who miss the crossing, returning from the sea in a terrible state. The drop-off points vary, but they are always in a pitiful state

On 2^{nd} May, there were 216 visits (according to the Home Office) but the number of those who tried it, and who came back exhausted, is much larger. Our team discovers a new camp that day, behind the "Terre et eaux" store, we have to go there early in the morning, before opening time so as not to inconvenience the customers and those who work there. On 2^{nd} May there were at least a hundred people, crammed three by three into Quechua tents for two, buried in the rubbish.

The same morning, at the Secours Catholique office, about 70 Ethiopians are hanging on to the railings, hoping for the opening. They are dying of hunger, some have had nothing for three days. We didn't have to stop there but, of course, we make a stop to satisfy them.

A little further on, on rue des Mouettes, about 130 people (men and women) are there, exhausted, with blisters on their feet. A lady, who would really need it, refuses to be taken to the PASS, to the hospital, because we could not go and look for her.

The next day at "Terre et eaux", there were 120 of them. There are some who have had nothing to drink for two days.

There is no one left at the Virval camp, but of course they will not all succeed in the Crossing and those who have failed will return.

Testimony of a volunteer on the weekend of 3rd/4th May:

A weekend like so many others.

Salam starts his tour of the camps.

One more camp discovered in the last two days.

Yemeni men hiding in a wood in delirious conditions...

Castaways... the same as a few days ago... Exhausted...

Women, some very young, for whom this life is even harder...

The Sudanese squat with a big smile... and their enormous hopes.

Yet all very tired, even exhausted.

But all with the same dream of the UK and finally a real life.

We are there, the volunteers of Salam and two Science Po students... We are young or between two or younger of everything.

We're all here... again and again because we want to give them at least the minimum... A dignified breakfast... a smile... a listening.

And we'd be here again and again seven days a week... because each of us is convinced that it is essential.

Everywhere the number of women, often extremely young, has increased enormously.

On 12th May, after a quiet period, there are again people on Rue des Mouettes, many Eritreans, life jackets, babies...

The next day, it was at the Quai de la Moselle that 180 people were found, who had missed the passage and had been brought back to the port. They are barefoot, soaked up to above their ears... We lack "shipwreck kits" (bags prepared, by size, with everything needed to dress a man from head to toe). On Rue des Mouettes, there are 200 Ethiopians, they have put their clothes to dry on the fence, a real shantytown!

At the Stadium we find about fifty people, people passing through. Exhausted women drag children by the hand in the same state of fatigue.

On the 21^{st} , at the "Terre et eaux" camp, there were about 200 people, including 40 to 60 soaked and limping, for whom our team had turned back. They tell of a gassing with a grenade rifle... Another, with a bruised face, says he was beaten up by the police...

The next day, the 22nd, the camp was completely dismantled.

THE DISMANTLINGS

Calais: an atmospheric photo (May 2 at BMX):



Little change in practices:

The camps are dismantled on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

On Monday, 12th May, the HRO (Human Rights Observers) failed the operation, but it did take place in the morning. A police commissioner who sees them waiting in the early afternoon, kindly, warns them. In the city centre, exiles confirm: they tell them that the convoy came around 11 am and that they took tents, in particular a dozen Pont Mollien.

It was the same thing on 26th May: the HRO abandoned his vigil at the police station at 9:54 a.m., in front of three CRS vans and no cleaning service... only to learn from the exiles in the afternoon that, yes, there had been evictions in the morning, as usual on Monday...

Indeed, the convoy often tries to escape the trained eye of the Human Rights Observers. On 21st, for example, he is getting ready in the courtyard of the gendarmerie.

It is always the same places that are concerned: the City Center, BMX and the rue de Judée.

On 14th May, there was the Marck site in addition (exiles had resettled there). The police do not let the Human Rights Observers approach and they see nothing but they hear on the policemen's walkie-talkie that a Sudanese man has been arrested.







An evacuation of another unusual site also took place on an additional day: the 22nd (a Thursday!) in "Terre et eaux", a place occupied by Yemenis...

The next day, on the 23rd, the Salam team met them again on rue des Mouettes. Happy and reassured to see us again, they literally kiss us... They slept there, with nothing, not even a blanket.

They also say that about sixty of them were taken to a Detention Centre...

It's not impossible, the HRO saw on the 22nd three minibuses taking turns and leaving full.

Three days later, some have returned to "Terre et eaux" but others are still sleeping on the ground on rue des Mouettes...

The legal basis given is usually "flagrante delicto". Three times, in May, another answer was given: *On 2nd May, the legal basis is "a complaint, there is no eviction," says a BMX operations manager. But it's the same operation all day long. Indeed, nineteen people moved on their own, including three women, there were no seizures of equipment, the police stressed that they had not used force and there was no security perimeter at the start (at least until the "woman of the National Police" had arrived, says the Human Rights Observers).

But then, in the city cente, a tarpaulin and a chair were seized on the Quai de la Gironde, and Pont Faidherbe eleven tents (two of which were emptied and three full of equipment).

*In BMX, on 5th May, the legal basis is, according to a police officer, "decision of the judicial court of Boulogne".

* on 23rd May, at the BMX, a policeman who was more disposed towards the Human Rights Observers explained a little more: it was a "judicial operation and you have nothing more to know: flagrante delicto, preliminary investigation, rogatory commission, search for a missing person..." »

The security perimeters are usual, extremely wide. They often make observations very difficult, if not impossible.



They only concern the associations, in particular the Human Rights Observers: on $23^{\rm rd}$ May one of their photos shows other people who quietly crossed the dam (in Marck, on $23^{\rm rd}$ May).

Did these people put themselves in danger? Or did they put the police in danger?

The police regularly spared families in the evacuations of the City Centre: one family (with 2 men and 2 children) was present but was not evacuated on 2nd May at the Pont Faidherbe, another on 7th May at the Quai de la Meuse, and Quai de la Gironde, as was the case for a woman with four children on 9th and 23rd May; on the 14th, the HRO saw a father take his child in his arms, but the The police leave the family alone. Unfortunately, it seems that the rights and serenity of the families were flouted on 28th May: When our team arrives at the BMX with breakfast, the men are completely stressed. They say that the police came very early in the morning and took away 22 people (only women and children, they left the men). They are in such a state that we tend to believe them. If this is true, how can you take away from a family the only thing left in such an uncertain situation: the comfort of being together...

Other bullying, less serious but real, is reported:

On 14th May at the BMX, the police prevented the exiles from going to a food distribution (probably La Vie Active), and on the 16th, five people (including two women) who were returning from a distribution were prevented from passing, and therefore from reaching their equipment.

On 16th May, under the Pont Mollien, on the Quai de la Meuse side, the cleaning agents, mounted on a ladder, searched high up under the bridge deck, and threw down some belongings (eleven, the HRO Human Rights Observer was able to count). We can't see very well on the videos taken from a distance but it looks exactly like what we saw last February (see our newsletter this month). One wonders, each time, why such a determination to take away their few possessions from people who have so little...



On all the sites, the belongings of the absentees are seized: we see a whole bric-a-brac on 5th May at the BMX.





A chair, pallets and firewood are collected on $\,21^{st}$ May at the BMX.

Of course it's not rich, but these are things that must be of service to people who are forced to live outside.



The tents collected are always dragged on the ground, therefore damaged...

Arrests are not uncommon, preceded by the humiliating body search (photo in the city center on 16th May):



On the Dunkirk side too, an atmospheric photo (May 9th):

The announcements of the authorities suggested it (see above): the dismantling in May was more numerous than in previous months: five times in the month (on the 6th, 9th, 15th, 20th and 28th).

But these are not evacuations near homes, as the authorities had announced on 8th May (see above).

On 15th May, the legal basis given by a police officer is: "Assistance to the Commissioner of Justice, Court of Boulogne".

Evacuations to Dunkirk generally take place in the presence of a bailiff and at the request of the prosecutor and they are accompanied by shelter (by bus, by the AFEJI).





On 6th May, a group of about twenty people (including three women and at least two babies) was evicted.



The police say that they accept shelter (at least twenty people). Indeed, the Human Rights Observers has sixteen people who get on the first bus. A second will follow.

On 15th May, too, there are many bus rides.

On the 28th, the AFEJI told the HRO that it was only taking people who had just been evacuated, but the bus left full, according to an exile's testimony, leaving people in pain on the side of the road.

On 20th May, a police officer, who had probably only recently arrived, was surprised that the sub-prefecture did not inform the associations of the dates of the evictions. He suggests asking for them...

The evacuation of 9th May almost exclusively concerned the shops, located at the distribution site (first photo) and opposite (second photo), on the other side of the road to Mardyck.





The one on the 15^{th} affects the camps that are near four companies (Ryssen, Total, Odorisation and Esso) and the one on the 20^{th} the neighbouring camps also of companies: SDMT, ESSO, Gracht Mardyck

At the end of the morning, 15th May, a small kitchen is demolished, the tarpaulin can be heard tearing on the video from which this photo is taken:



On the 28th, the eviction lasted all morning, AMiS who was giving breakfast that day had not yet been able to intervene at 11:30 a.m. They had been waiting for an hour and a half. The shops are once again totally destroyed, and it is the camps near two companies that are affected again (Total and Esso) and not those closest to the houses...

On 20th May, the HRO Human Rights Observers, also witnessed the removal of a small bridge.







The resources deployed are significant: twelve CRS trucks on 15th May, a large backhoe loader on the 6th (photo), 9th and 28th to evacuate the equipment by loading it into the skip (photo of 28th May).



On the 28th, there was also an impressive destruction machine in the Total car park.

Human displacement was significant on 15th May: at least 168 people (including at least eighteen women and fourteen children) were displaced. On the 28th even more: the HRO, has more than 300 people wandering.

We see a big bus start before 8 a.m. on May 15th, at the edge of the railway tracks.

At least two arrests were made on 6th and 9th May (more spectacular on the 9th: a CRS van returned after the convoy had left: gas and LBD were out. The HRO witnesses two arrests: one with patdown, one with handcuffs behind his back.) At least ten arrests were made on the 15th.

ASSOCIATIONS AND JUSTICE:

Camp evacuations decided by the court.

After the evacuation of the Orange squat decided by the Administrative Court on 11th April, 2025, but with a delay of five months, it is that of the so-called "Fontinettes" camp that was granted to the SNCF by the same court on 23rd May, and this time without delay. This decision can be applied from one day to the next...

A request for summary proceedings was filed on 30th May to obtain a systematic collection of garbage in the Calais camps.

CFC, Solidarités International and Salam have filed this request.

It is a request that is processed in a week because the judge recognizes its urgency (otherwise it takes a year and a half to two years at the Administrative Court!)

We have filed this summary appeal against the authorities in Calais, demanding that they take urgent measures to provide waste management solutions in all places inhabited by exiled people.

This legal action follows the refusal of the Calais authorities to provide solutions despite the numerous requests from associations, collectives, volunteers and citizens in recent years.

The hearing has been set for Tuesday, 3rd June at 11 a.m., at the Administrative Court of Lille, 5 Rue Geoffrey Saint-Hilaire.

DUNKIRK, THE EVENING DISTRIBUTIONS:

Pascaline and/or Quentin, sometimes accompanied by one or two volunteers...

Listing the requests received, preparing the belongings and loading them into the truck takes an average of two hours. Then, a distribution lasts an average of two hours.

Thank you to Denise, Marie and the other volunteers who sort the clothing donations.

Since the beginning of April, Pascaline and Quentin have been giving us a weekly presentation of their actions. Here is a summary for the month of May.

A few preliminary remarks:

- * "It should be noted that the Refugee Women's Center met 386 new women and 473 children in April. Among the children, 91 of them were under 2 years old, 127 between 2 and 5, 156 between 5 and 12! A young Moroccan man came to us on Wednesday (30th April) in a rather advanced state of exhaustion, he showed us his prosthesis. He lost his leg on the road while trying to cross a border by train. What a pity!! And yet he kept smiling and courageous!! »
- * "This weekend (that of 17th May), between yesterday morning and the time of writing to you, I received 70 messages calling for help...

The needs are enormous at the moment. Associations are struggling to cope with the number of people present and the evacuations, where all of the people's belongings are destroyed, add a lot of tension to the already critical situation.

We meet a lot of people, including children, who have almost nothing on their backs even though it's not hot at all... »

Few problems with the police:

 3^{rd} May: "Of course, we ran into the police, who once just slowed down and the second time stopped to ask us who we were. When we said "Salam" they told us "YOU AGAIN !!", but did not want to see our papers. They seemed to be worried about the departure of families to the beaches. »

"Please note: no police visit on Monday (19th May) or Friday (23rd May) in the Total car park... »

DISTRIBUTION BALANCE:

between 2 and 4 distributions per week, depending on the situation (weather, dismantling, etc.) In May, between the 1st and the 26th, the following were given:

- 16 tents for 2 people bought by Salam (unit cost of 30€), plus a large one for a family,
- Thank you to those who made financial donations to Salam, targeted for the purchase of tents.
- 397 blankets,
- shoes (about twenty pairs on average per week),
- Clothes by boxes (socks, sweaters/sweatshirts, jogging pants/ jeans, t-shirts, hats, scarves and boxer shorts and jackets...) ,
- towels and hygiene products,



OUISTREHAM, 18th May: visit by Quentin Duflos. A BRIEF VISIT TO THE CAMP AND SQUAT IN OUISTREHAM (NORMANDY).

On the afternoon of Sunday, 18th May, accompanied by Sarah, a volunteer at La Cimade in Caen, and Bénédicte (who lives in Argentan and who comes to Salam several times a year), I went to Ouistreham to better understand the situation of the Sudanese exiles who survive there.

Stop number 1: the camp in a wood near the port where a dozen guys survive.

The town hall was forced by the courts, following the fight of the associations, to install toilets there.

The authorities tried to dismantle the camp but the courts refused. For the rest, the guys manage. Up to 200 exiles slept there in the summer of 2023.



Stop number 2: the squat in the city centre opened by activists in January 2025 where about twenty guys live.

As the water and electricity have not been cut off, they can cook (thanks to the products provided by associations including the Restos du Cœur), wash and sleep in shelter.



Some of these Sudanese are coming to regain their strength between their attempts to get into trucks in Calais (in the hope of reaching the United Kingdom). But the majority are asylum seekers for whom the State does not offer any accommodation solution (despite the legal obligation). There are almost no attempts to cross from Ouistreham to England because security has been reinforced to its maximum.

During this sunny afternoon, we were able to play "uno" with them (so that they could take their mind off things for a moment and progress in French) and taste assida (a delicious Sudanese specialty made of flour and water) accompanied by mulah (a sauce made from onions, tomatoes and sardines). Lots of laughter and smiles despite their precarious living conditions).

A big thank you to Sarah, a volunteer at La Cimade in Caen, and to the other volunteers (especially those from CAMO, Collectif d'Aide aux Migrants de Ouistreham) for giving some dignity to these young men who were forced to flee Sudan, which has been in the grip of a civil war since April 2023.





MIXED FEELINGS FESTIVAL IN EUROPE

The pretty self of May has often inspired poets or artists "May, May, let's train the May / Whoever marries today will be rich" (1). Trees are planted in May to celebrate nature that is reborn with spring. Tradition dictates that young unmarried men in the villages put up trees in front of the door or wall of the houses of the young girls to be married to honour them. May corresponds to the return of festivals, with the most famous of them, the Cannes International Film Festival, dedicated to cinema since 1939 to counter the Venice Film Festival, created and instrumentalized in 1932 by the fascist and Nazi regimes (2). With the stranglehold on culture, another symbol is very revealing of the state of anguish, and even existential fear of a society - its way of welcoming exiles and addressing the migration issue.

The signals sent by the European Union and a group of ideologically close European countries on the migration issue are worrying (3). After authorising European states in March 2025 to create "return platforms" for undocumented migrants outside Europe, the European Commission has planned on 20th May 2025 to review the concept of "safe third country" to facilitate the deportation of asylum seekers to countries through which they have transited (4). The door is open for asylum seekers' centres in distant countries, projects that have already been tested in Rwanda by the United Kingdom and Denmark. The relaxation of the concept of "safe third country" responds to the request made in May 2024, as part of the Pact on Migration and Asylum, by some fifteen countries, at the initiative of Austria, Denmark and Italy. The Commission must "identify, develop and propose new means and new solutions to fight immigration in Europe". The 2024 legislation requires national asylum authorities to prove the existence of a link between the applicant and the safe third country concerned (having lived there, worked, etc.). In 2025, the Commission suggests that the notion of link should be considerably lightened. A simple passage of the asylum seeker is enough. If there has been no transit, an agreement or arrangement with this "safe third country" will suffice. The States concerned must nevertheless meet conditions - "protection against refoulement, absence of a real risk of serious harm to life and liberty on account of race, religion, nationality (...) or political opinion", "the possibility of requesting or receiving effective protection". The greatest uncertainty is that the European countries and the third countries concerned will jointly reject the reception and asylum of refugees plunged "into limbo", according to the director of the European Refugee Network. The case has already occurred with the agreement between the European Union and Turkey in 2016, where thousands of refugees rejected by Greece were also pushed back by their Turkish neighbour.

More worrying is the unprecedented attack by European political leaders, orchestrated by Prime Ministers Giorgia Melloni in Italy, heiress to a post-fascist party, and Mette Frederiksen in Denmark, a Social Democrat, along with seven other countries, against the European Court of Human Rights (ECHR) in Strasbourg and the 1950 Convention that judges are responsible for interpreting and applying in their judgments (5).

According to this group of European countries ideologically close to immigration issues, this text protecting the rights of exiles is unsuited to the "major issues of our time" and the magistrates in charge of applying it have exceeded their rights, encroaching on national sovereignty. For a law professor at the University of Brussels, the countries attacking the ECHR have not detailed any judgment that they consider contentious. It is therefore an ideological statement that is in line with the state of mind of an American president, inaugurated on 20th January, 2025, who has multiplied xenophobic and anti-immigration statements. He has been caught by the justice system, the last bastion to defend the rule of law, which he has constantly attacked. In a particularly explosive geopolitical context, these attacks on an international convention considered for 75 years as one of the pillars of the European project, a unique model, recognised by all democracies, to fight against discrimination and defend diversity, are not fortuitous. The magistrates of Strasbourg, like the judges in the United States, are the last bulwarks against the populist assaults of far-right ideologies.

Unexpected support came from culture, with the 78th Cannes Film Festival coming to an end on Saturday, 24th May 2025 (6). The list celebrates and defends all the diversities attacked by authoritarian regimes, past and present. The Palme d'Or was awarded to the Iranian, French and Luxembourg film by Jafar Panahi "A Simple Accident". The director, an influential filmmaker of the Iranian New Wave, was sentenced in 2010 to six years in prison for propaganda against the mullahs' regime. He had to shoot clandestinely. Her film, which won an award at Cannes in 2025, addresses the Iranian regime's fierce repression against its opponents, particularly young people and women, since the outbreak of the "Woman, Life, Freedom" movement in 2022. A Brazilian, French, Dutch and German film by director Kleber Mendonça Filho, "The Secret Agent", received the award for Best Director and Best Actor. He evokes the period of the dictatorship in Brazil (1964-1985) to denounce neoconservative and conspiracy regimes today, with a recurrence in Brazil with Javier Bolsonaro (2019-2023). Authoritarian regimes always target minorities, the weakest and most vulnerable. The Best Actress Award was presented to a French actress, Nadia Melliti, in the film by French director Hafsia Herzi, "La Petite Dernier" (winner of the Queer Palm) for her self-proclaimed portrayal of a young lesbian Muslim woman.

Democracy is under attack on all continents, in all latitudes. The best indicator of a country's democratic health is respect for diversity in all its facets. The fight to defend the rights of exiles, the LGBTQIA+community, religious or cultural minorities is the same... Today, as in the past, culture and justice are essential bulwarks against the repeated assaults of populist and authoritarian regimes when they are defended by courageous and honest artists and judges, who have the means to lead their fight, through a demanding legal and regulatory framework and lasting financial support. Europe and the European Union, with their imperfections and blindness, remain the best bastions against autocratic regimes, and the first supporters of a "universalism of differences", dear to Edouard Glissant, a West Indian artist, author of "essays and novels dealing with the notions of otherness, living together and interculturality", defender with Victor Segalen of an "aesthetics of the Diverse" (7). It is the common thread of an exhibition "Paris noir" at the Centre Beaubourg - black artists who came from North America, the West Indies or Africa to find in Paris a land of choice and inspiration, and a freedom of expression that they were deprived of elsewhere. Long live Europe, diverse and free, yesterday and today.


